Author Tom Murphy pens novel honoring legacy of his late wife Barb

Sometimes, the hardest lessons in life to learn are the ones that leave the biggest mark on the soul. They can be painful, but they are often rewarding, opening doors to self-discovery that we may have previously locked on ourselves.


Author Tom Murphy knows that all too well. Some of his toughest lessons for him occurred after he learned his wife was dying of lung cancer. While an extremely difficult experience, the leadup to Barb's passing in 2016 was a time of understanding and introspection.

"I was amazed at how she dealt with her illness," said The Pinehills resident. "Barb accepted it with strength and courage. She never complained or acted as a victim. I kept asking her about how she found the fortitude to face this terrible disease."

Her answers provided the basis for Murphy's own growth and development - not to mention a deeper love with his wife, whom he was already very close to. The relationship subjects they explored are now the basis of a novel written by Murphy, "The Anniversary Box: A Love Story."



Murphy and his wife had a close relationship to start. They were dedicated marathon runners, often training and racing together. However, when Barb learned she had nonsmoker's lung cancer in 2010, Murphy found himself being drawn closer to her. Rather than shut down to protect himself from eventual pain, he opened up to better understand what she was going through and help her with a difficult experience.

me. She was so healthy and had never smoked a day in her life." At the time, the couple lived in Seattle, where one of the top doctors in the country for this disease practiced. Howard West went above and beyond to help his wife through the illness.

"He was wonderful," Murphy said. "Whatever she needed, he took care of it for her. Barb could call him anytime to ask questions or just to talk."

The Murphys moved to Plymouth in 2013 to be closer to her family on Cape Cod and their daughter Caitlin. After his wife passed in 2016, Murphy knew he had to honor her in

some way.

"Barb had two passions in life: running and beer," he recalled.

Called Barb's Beer, proceeds go to finding a cure for lung cancer through www.cancergrace.org, which was started by West, Barb's doctor.

However, that wasn't enough for Murphy. He felt like he needed to do more to honor the memory of his wife. Murphy had an idea for a novel but just couldn't find the time to write it. He was busy with his day job as director of Edge4Vets, a foundation established by Fordham University to assist returning military veterans with assimilation back into the private workforce. He also directs the Human Resiliency Foundation hardcover, paperback and digiat Fordham.

writing "The Anniversary Box." He has written two other books, both nonfiction. Murphy plans to funnel proceeds from the novel to Barb's Beer to honor his wife's legacy and support West's research.

With his book about to be published, Murphy has only one suggestion for readers:

"Buy the book, grow the beer and raise funds to cure lung cancer," he said. "That's what Barb would want."

Published by Encircle Publications, "The Anniversary Box" will be released Aug. 2, the date of the Murphys' wedding anniversary. It will be available in tal online and in stores.
